Modern Sports

This is a beginning taekwondo course in which students will develop the basic techniques necessary to play taekwondo. Taekwondo is one of the most systematic and scientific Korean traditional martial arts, that teaches more than physical fighting skills. It is a discipline that shows ways of enhancing our spirit and life through training our body and mind. There will be two components classroom and practical rotating weekly.

Introduction to Art

This class focuses on appreciating their work made after 1980s and form their own perception. Through art history, lets understand what kind of innovative changes art has gone through and cultivate our creativity.

Introduction to Wellness

Introduction to Wellness is designed for college students to understand the need and assume the responsibility for maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Wellness includes activities, behaviors, and attitudes which improve the quality of life and contributes to longevity. Wellness is physical, mental and social well-being. The course content includes an overview of the seven dimensions of wellness in addition to physical activity, stress management, nutrition assessment. Students are required to actively participate in classroom and group discussions and to demonstrate their knowledge to the teacher and the class.

Understanding Space: Human Beings, Architecture, City

Human, Architecture, City is a reading space course designed to study and discuss the competing development interests, planning and considerations that intersect with the social, economic, legal, environmental and built environment of urban areas and regions. How is architecture and development related to social, political, design, and economic factors and what are distinct characteristics that set it apart? This course will examine commonalities and tensions between these forces, with a specific focus on the concerns and issues that often distinguish tourism design planning from other development.

The Civil Rights Movement

This course will examine the U.S. civil rights movement. We will explore the origins of the movement in the early twentieth century, and the victories of the movement in the 1960s. Students will reflect on the key players and methods they used in the civil rights movement. We will also look at the legacy of the civil rights movement and how the movement has changed society around the globe.

Global Issues

Cite and reference resources used in research. In this course, students will read or watch and talk about news and opinion pieces regarding major problems facing the world today as well as their histories and potential solutions. At the conclusion of this course, the successful students will be able to do the following:Understand the reasons behind the rise of these global issues as well as the differing opinions on all sides of the debate. Write about these issues, giving their opinions and providing information from their own research and experiences outside of the classroom. Deliver their own opinions on these issues in class in front of their classmates.

Music and Creativity

Music composition is an art that has been practiced by our species since prehistory. It is away to communicate thoughts, ideas and emotions nonverbally, as well as elevating verbal modes (through singing). We all have done it in some way or another, whether we are idly humming a melody, comically stylizing speech, making up tunes on a piano or guitar, or even penning great symphonies. Music is a part of our human experience, and many people have a desire to put their thoughts and feelings into music, just as one would write a poem in a secret notebook.

Concert of Economics

Students will learn some of the basic concepts of micro-and macroeconomics in this course and will apply them to discussions intended to improve knowledge of the material, their society and economics in general. Post-discussion writing assignments will improve student's formal writing skills and give them the opportunity to research, think for themselves, and give and support their opinions.
